We met in Lyceum Hall on the evening of March 21, to hold a joint meeting with our brothers. A literary program was enjoyed which was followed by refreshments.

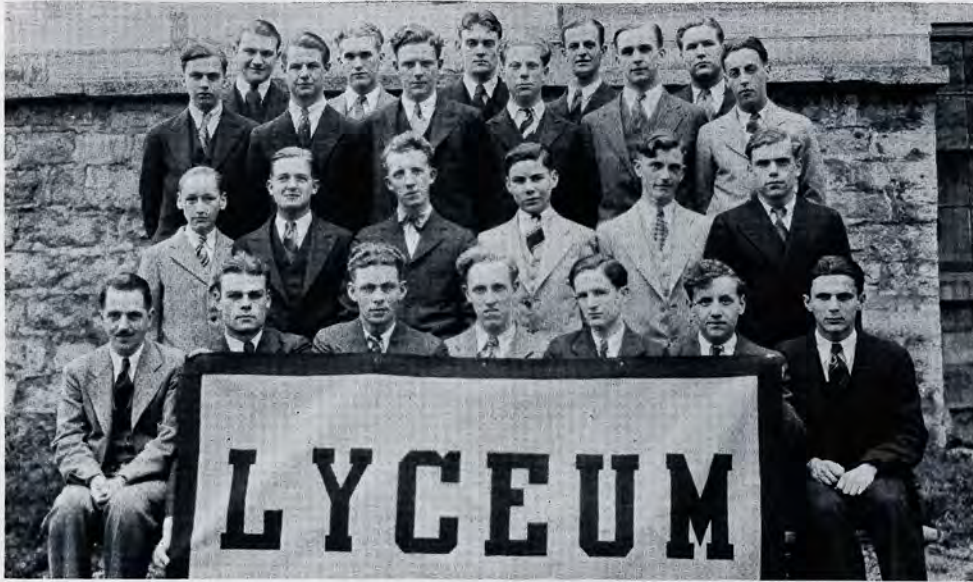
Our meeting with the Alumni on March 26 was rather unusual as well as enjoyable.

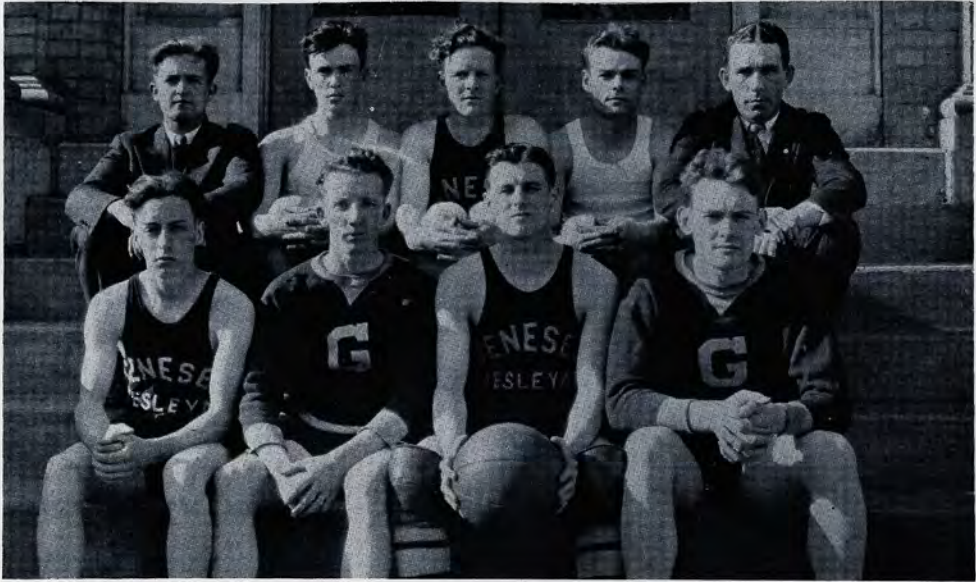

A large number of girls turned out at the beginning of the season, but the number diminished. There were only three girls from last year's team and most of the new material had no basketball experience.

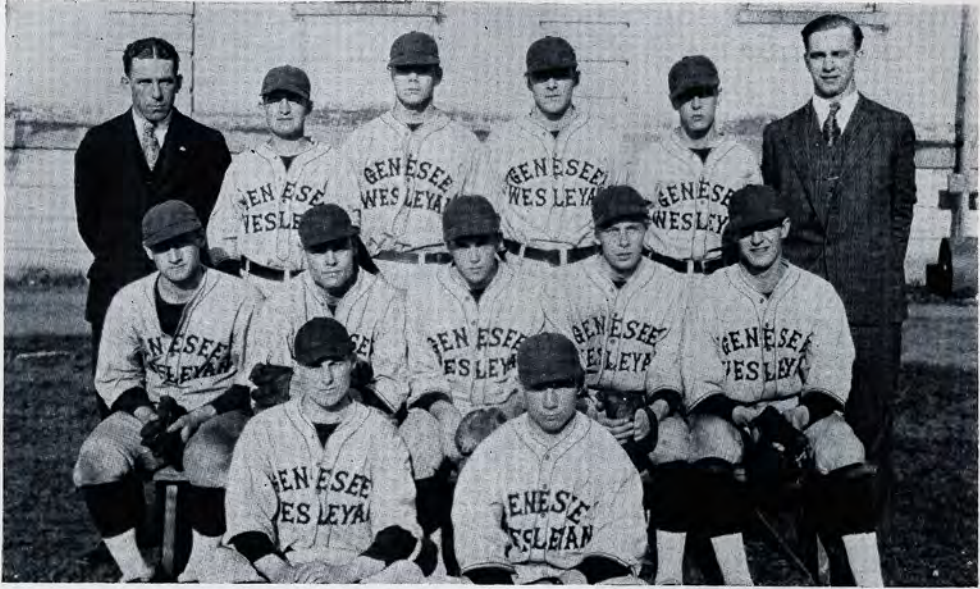
