We would not fail to mention the initiation which followed so soon after the reception, for it was at that time that twenty new girls learned the diversities of society life.

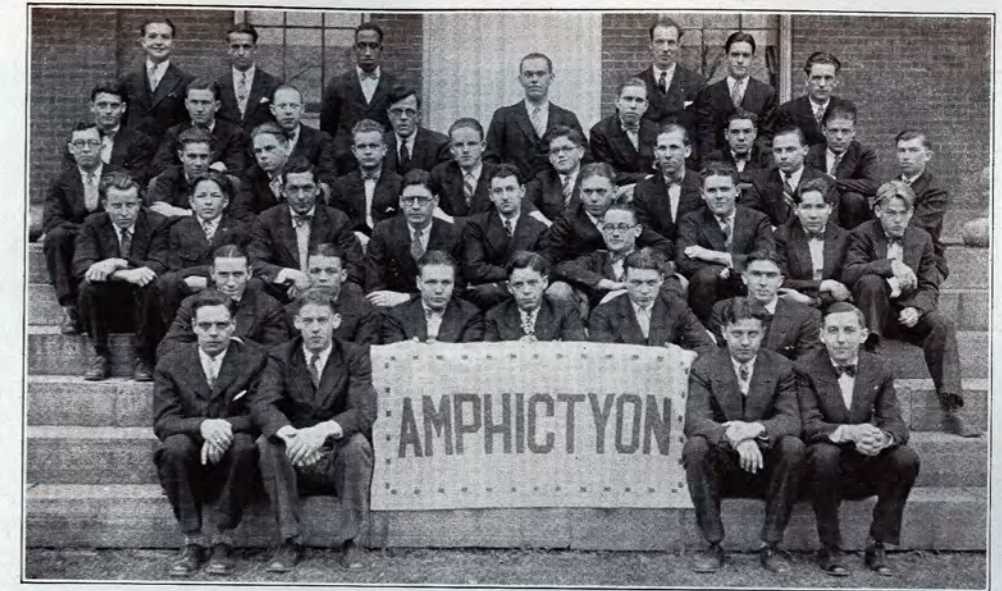

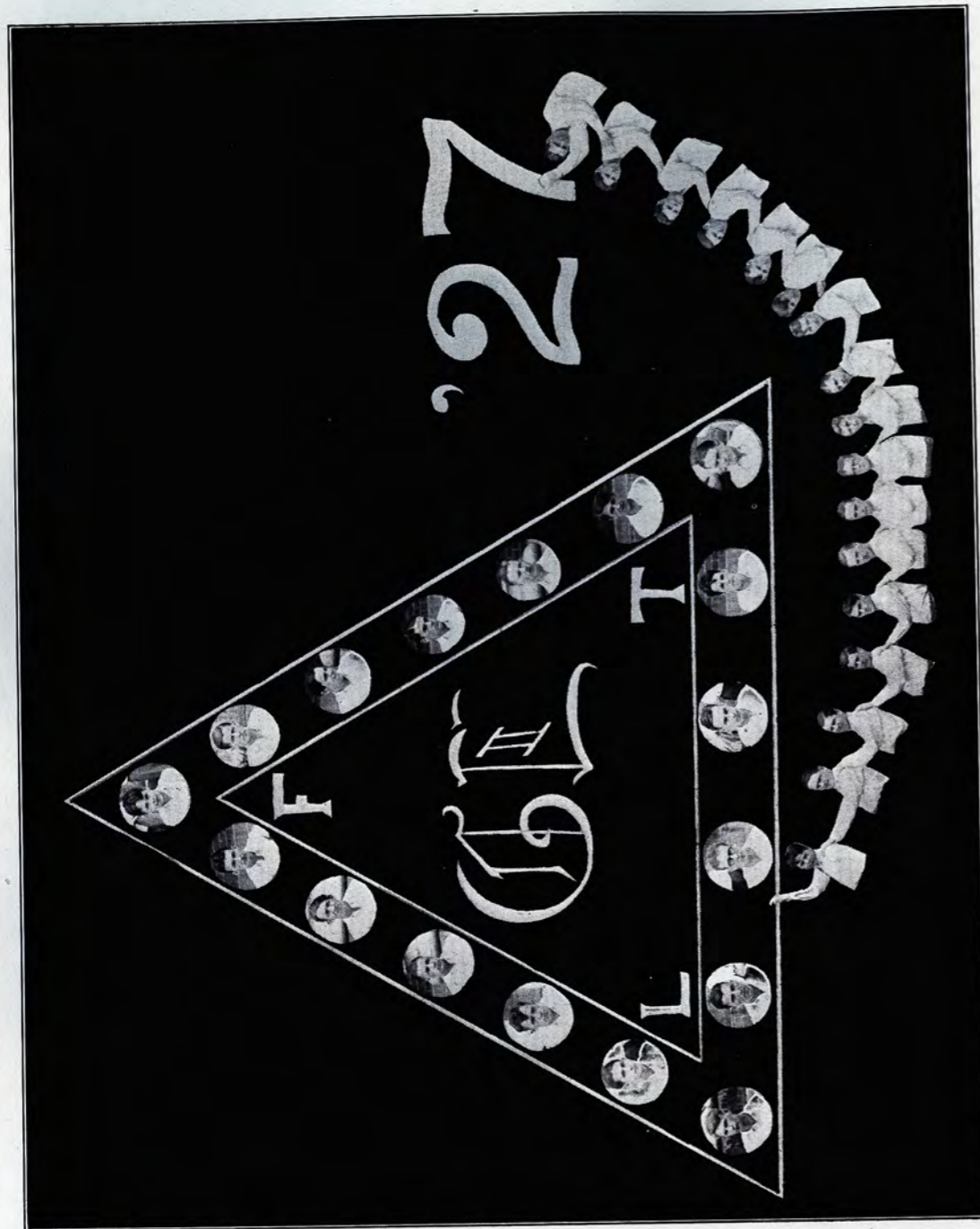
This year, "The Lamentable Tragedy of Julius Caesar" was presented for the Public and was a complete success.
