Requirements for Admission.

Candidates for admission to the Classical Course are required to pass a written examination in the following studies:

1. English Grammar, Geography, and History of the United States.
2. Arithmetic, Algebra to equations of the second degree, and Plane Geometry.
3. A certificate of the Regents will be regarded as an equivalent to examination in Arithmetic, Geography and Grammar.
3. Harkness' Latin Grammar, Four books of Cæsar's Commentaries, Six books of Virgil's *Aeneid*, Six select orations of Cicero, Sallust's *Catiline*, Sallust's *Jugurthine War*, or the *Eclogues* of Virgil, and the First and Second parts of Harkness' *Introduction to Latin Composition*.
4. *Hadley's Greek Grammar, Three books of Xenophon's *Anabasis*, and One book of Homer's *Iliad*, with *Prosody*.
5. Classical Geography, Greek and Roman Antiquities.

Candidates for the Scientific Course are examined in the requirements marked 1 and 2.

Candidates for an advanced standing are examined in the preparatory studies, and in all those that have been pursued by the class they wish to enter, or in studies that may be deemed equivalent. It is very important that candidates should be thoroughly prepared in the requirements for admission, especially in grammatical and elementary knowledge.

The regular examinations for admission to College take place on the Thursday and Friday immediately preceding COMMENCEMENT, and on Tuesday and Wednesday before the beginning of the Fall Term. Candidates will present themselves on the first of the two days named; they will, however, be examined at such other times as may be appointed, when application shall be made. Satisfactory testimonials of a good moral character will in all cases be required, and students coming from other Colleges must present certificates of regular dismission.

No student can be received for less than one Term.

* Instructors are requested to teach their pupils to pronounce Greek, with the Greek accents, and with the so-called *Continental* sound of the vowels and diphthongs,—for example, give *a* the sound of *a* in *father*, *e* that of *a* in *fate*, *i* that of *i* in *machine*, *ei* that of *ei* in *height*, *oo* that of *oo* in *moon*, *av* that of *ou* in *house*.

The Professor of Modern Languages will give familiar lectures on French and German Literature, in connection with the authors read.

The Professor of Ancient Languages will, occasionally give familiar lectures upon the Antiquities, History and Literature of the Greeks and Romans.

A course of lectures will be given the first term upon Physics, and the second term upon General Chemistry.

In the School of Agricultural Chemistry lectures will be given in the first and second terms.

Hebrew Course.

On alternate years there will be a class in Hebrew, which language may be taken in place of French. This arrangement affords instruction in Hebrew during the Junior or Senior year.*

Select Course.

Students not intending to complete either the Classical or Scientific Course, may recite in such College Classes as their qualifications will permit. They may thus have opportunity to pursue an extended course of English study in connection with such languages of the College Course as they may select.

They will be expected to attend such general exercises as may be assigned them, and be subject to the general rules of the College.

School of Agricultural Chemistry.

In this School are taught the applications of Chemistry to Agriculture. Instruction is given by means of text books, lectures and experimental practice in the laboratory. Students will derive important advantage from a previous acquaintance with General Chemistry, yet this is not made a requirement for admission.

It will be the constant aim, not only to cultivate in the student habits of critical observation by the actual examination and analysis of soils, fertilizers, and agricultural products in the laboratory, but also to train him in the best methods of conducting independent experiments in the field, as the fruitful sources of improvement and success in agricultural pursuits.

This school is open to all whose previous studies will enable them advantageously to pursue the course, provided that at least three such persons make application for instruction. A fee of three dollars is required to defray the expenses of materials used by the students in the laboratory.

* The present Junior Class can elect Hebrew in the year 1869-70.

Expenses.

TUITION.

By recent action of the Board of Trustees, TUITION is made FREE.

There is a charge of one dollar for each course of Lectures in Physics and Chemistry, to defray the expenses of the laboratory.

INCIDENTALS.

A charge of five dollars a term is made for incidentals, and for the use of the Library.

For every private examination a fee of one dollar will be charged, to be appropriated to the improvement of the Library and Apparatus. Scrip for private examination must be obtained of the Treasurer by the student before he can be examined.

All College bills are payable at the beginning of the Term, and no Degree will be conferred, nor will any student receive a regular dismission from the College until all College dues are secured.

Discipline.

The government of the College is designed to secure attention to study and correct deportment, not so much by enforcing rigid enactments, as by cultivating in the student a taste for intellectual pursuits. No student who indulges in gaming, intemperance, or other vices, no one who is frequently absent from his room at night, or who habitually neglects his studies, can be allowed to remain a member of the College.

Merit Roll.

A daily account of the attendance, scholarship and conduct of every student is kept. The result, determining his place on the Merit Roll, is entered at the close of each term on the Records of the College. A report of the standing and demeanor of students will be sent to their parents or guardians when requested.

Public Worship.

Prayers are attended daily in the College Chapel. All students are required to attend public service on the Sabbath; in the morning at one of the churches in the village, and in the afternoon at the College Chapel.

Examinations.

At the close of each Term, the classes are required to pass a written examination in the studies of the Term. Students claiming to have pursued any part or parts of our course, of study, independent of our instructions, are required to be examined in the same manner on such studies in the presence of the Faculty.

Degrees.

The Degree of Bachelor of Arts is conferred on all students who have completed the Classical Course, and sustained a satisfactory examination on every part thereof.

The Degree of Bachelor of Science is conferred on all students who give satisfactory evidence of the completion of the Scientific Course.

The Degree of Master of Arts is conferred on every Bachelor of Arts of three years standing, who, in the interval, has sustained a good moral character.

Applications should be made to the Secretary of the Faculty at least two weeks before Commencement.

Prizes.

The interest of a Prize Fund of \$500, founded by DAVID DECKER Esq., of Elmira, will be given to the two members of the Senior Class who shall write the best English Essays.

The SOCIETY Prize will be awarded for superiority in the writing and delivery of an English Oration. The contestants for this prize are to be selected by the members of the Aletheon and Atticæum, from the Sophomore and Junior Classes.

The interest of a Prize Fund of \$500, founded by JAMES R. WOOD, M. D., LL. D., of New York, will be given to two members of the Sophomore Class for superiority in Mathematics, to be determined by special examination.

The PRESIDENT'S Prizes will be awarded for superiority in Elocution. The contestants are to be selected from the Freshman Class, and are restricted to selections from Forensic, Parliamentary and Sacred Oratory, to the exclusion of poetry and the drama.

The President's First Prize was awarded last year to EDWARD M. SAWYER.

The President's Second Prize was awarded to ELIZABETH THROOP.

The Decker First Prize was awarded to CARLTON C. WILBOR, and the Second Prize to WILLIAM WARD HUNT.

The Society Prize was awarded to OSCAR A. HOUGHTON, of the ALETHEON SOCIETY.

The Wood First Prize was awarded to JOHN S. MORGAN, and the Second Prize to PORTER MONTGOMERY FRENCH.

Libraries.

The Libraries of the College and the Literary Societies contain an aggregate of about five thousand volumes, and additions are annually made.

Cabinets.

The Geological and Mineralogical and Zoological Cabinets contain a valuable collection of rare and beautiful specimens, illustrative of the various departments of Natural Science. The friends of the College are invited to send to these Cabinets such specimens as may add to their completeness and value.

Apparatus.

The Chemical and Philosophical Apparatus is of the most approved construction, and, together with the charts and diagrams, affords the means of a wide range for experimental illustrations. The laboratory is well supplied with the necessary chemicals and appliances, and has recently been enlarged; additions have also been made to the apparatus with special reference to the School of Agricultural Chemistry. There is a superior Telescope, a Transit Instrument, an Astronomical Clock, &c., for the department of Astronomy; and there are all the needful instruments for field exercise in Surveying.

Societies.

The Aletheon, Atticæum, and Adelpian are public Literary Societies, furnishing ample facilities for improvement in composition, public speaking and parliamentary usage. Each Society has its room and library, and holds a public literary exercise each term in the College Hall.

Students of the College are not allowed to be acting members of Literary Societies which are not connected with the College.

Graduating Course.

The Graduating Course of the Seminary is designed to occupy three years, according to the following scheme:

Students entering upon this course of study are required to be thoroughly acquainted with Geography (McNally, Cornell, or Guyot), Arithmetic (Robinson's Higher), Elementary Algebra entire (Robinson), and English Grammar and Analysis.

Students from other Schools are received to advanced standing on passing a satisfactory examination* in the previous studies of the course, or their equivalents; *provided* they shall spend at least two terms immediately prior to graduation at this Institution.

The course in French and German has been extended, and commencing classes are formed only in the Fall Term. Those completing the course receive the honors of the School in the form of a Diploma.

Department of Music.

This department is thoroughly organized, and the course of instruction is complete.

It is in charge of a gentleman of thorough musical education, and extensive experience in teaching.

The thoroughness which characterizes the other departments, will be insisted on in this.

By employing experienced teachers, and furnishing the best instruments for practice, the Trustees offer the best advantages to those desiring to perfect themselves in vocal or instrumental music.

A course intended to occupy about three years, is arranged for each student, comprising selections from the following studies, and those who complete such a course, and, on examination, are found to understand thoroughly the technics of piano forte playing, receive a diploma.

For the cultivation of style and expression, pieces adapted to the advancement of the pupil, are given from the first.

Drawing and Painting.

The Art Room has recently been enlarged to nearly twice its former size, and has been otherwise adapted to the wants of the department, with especial reference to securing good light and good air.

The course in Drawing, having been carefully revised, is as follows:

1. Straight lines.
2. Angles of various dimensions.
3. Curved lines.
4. Plane figures.
5. Solid figures.
6. Foregrounds and buildings.
7. Foliage and landscape.
8. Marine views.
9. Flowers and fruit.
10. Animals.
11. The human figure.

Use is made of Bartholomew's Course in Drawing, and in connection with the different steps of the series, lessons are given in Object Drawing, including the locating of actual lines in regular figures, projecting these figures in relief, by means of light and shade, drawing from still-life, and sketching from nature, with the essential elements of perspective.

Instruction will also be given in the beautiful art of Illumination.

This art, in itself so attractive, and so interwoven with classic and romantic history, affords rare means for culture, both in drawing and in coloring, and also stimulates the inventive faculty to the execution of new designs.

A chief aim is to develop the artistic talent in accuracy of observation, and to train the hand to facility in expression.

Culture in the love of The Beautiful is also sought, and, during the winter term, lectures are given on the History of Art, with the design of awakening an interest in the study of the great masters and their works.

The course in painting comprises Landscape, with sketching from nature, and the painting of flowers, fruit, and other objects included in the term Still-life.

On the completion of either course, a diploma of appropriate design will be awarded.

Commercial School.

To meet the growing demand for thorough and practical Business Education, commodious rooms and improved apparatus have been provided in this Department, rendering it still more attractive and profitable than heretofore. Always maintained upon a basis of genuine merit, providing instruction systematic and thorough, it is a first class Business Institute, offering advantages such as are rarely found.

Full Commercial Course.

A complete course of instruction has been organized, including Book-Keeping in all its various forms and applications to business, Penmanship, Commercial Calculations, Business Forms, Mercantile Correspondence, Commercial Law, Detecting Counterfeit Money, and other collateral branches. Several improvements have just been introduced, including a new and unique system of BUSINESS PRACTICE, making it conform still more to the actual Counting House.

Book-Keeping.

The instruction in Book-Keeping is eminently thorough, combining theory and practice in a most delightful manner. THIRTY different sets of books are prepared in manuscript, which are the counterpart of actual business transactions in our large cities, and embracing the most approved forms known to modern business. These include Wholesale and Retail Merchandising, Commission, Joint Stock Companies, Executors' Books, Mining, Manufacturing, Jobbing, Banking, Brokerage, &c.

Great care is taken to give the student a clear idea of the Analysis and classification of Accounts, the Opening and Closing of Books, the Law of Promissory Notes, Drafts, Bills of Exchange, &c., matters of vital importance in Book-Keeping.

Penmanship.

The beautiful and universally popular system of Spencerian Penmanship is taught, it is believed, in its purity. The old method of servile mechanical imitation is discarded, and Penmanship is brought to take its stand where it belongs, among the fine arts. Students are induced to learn from a love of the art, and not as a mere drudgery which is submitted to from necessity. Movement exercises are introduced to develop the whole of the person's power for writing, while effort is constantly made to elevate the ideal standard of the writer, not destroying his own individuality, but encouraging it, thus making ready and efficient penmen in the shortest possible time.

SPECIMENS OF PENMANSHIP are kept constantly on file, wherein the student's proficiency is clearly seen, from time to time, by the sure test of comparison.

Persons well qualified in this branch command more lucrative positions than in any other department of teaching, and we can furnish all such with good situations.

Detecting Counterfeit Notes.

The student is familiarized with those special features and beautiful devices which form the *standard of excellence* of all genuine bank notes, and with which the best counterfeits will fail in comparison, and thus is enabled at a glance to detect the most dangerous counterfeit that can possibly be executed.

Unusual facilities are given in this popular and useful branch to those *outside* of the regular course.

Diplomas.

Students upon completing the course, undergo a rigid examination, and if satisfactorily passed, receive a Diploma, signed by the teachers and officers of the Institution.

Time of Entrance.

Students can enter at any time, as each receives separate instruction; by close application, the course can be completed in one term.

It is better, for various reasons, that they devote their whole time to the course; many, however, in connection with it, take other studies in the Seminary with profit.

Those whose preliminary education is deficient, and who wish to take but a partial course in Book-Keeping, will be permitted to take such course from a printed *text book* at their option. The tuition of such students will be according to arrangement.

Normal Instruction.

In the Fall and Winter terms, Normal classes are formed. The best methods of instruction and government, and all topics relating to the teacher's work, are considered either in recitations or lectures. Jewell's Treatise on School Government is used.

Cabinet.

The Cabinet of Mineralogical and Geological specimens embraces an ample collection of rocks, soils, &c., &c., including a full suit received from the State, and it is deemed quite equal to the wants of the students pursuing those branches.

Students also have access at stated times, to the extensive Cabinet of Natural History.

Libraries and Reading Room.

The Libraries belonging to the Institution contain about 4,000 volumes. To the Seminary Library students have access without extra charge.

A flourishing public Reading Room is sustained by an appropriation of the Trustees, and the voluntary subscriptions of students.

Societies.

AMPHICTYON, GENESEE LYCEUM, LADIES' INGELÖW SOCIETY.— These Societies have, each, a Library and an appropriately furnished room.

No person is allowed to be an acting member of these Societies, who is not at the same time a student in the Seminary.

THE PHILHARMONIC SOCIETY is an organization having for its object "the cultivation of music, sacred and secular, for mutual pleasure and improvement," and it affords an excellent opportunity, for those who can render plain Church Music readily, to keep in vocal practice. The Society now has a Musical Library of nearly 500 volumes.

Note to Parents and Guardians.

Students should enter school at the beginning of the term. Those coming a few days late are much embarrassed.

Students should not seek excuses during the term for the purpose of visiting at home or elsewhere; and in no case except when the most urgent considerations render absence unavoidable. A short absence occasions serious disadvantage.

It is earnestly advised that all moneys for the use of the younger students be deposited with some officer of the Seminary; and that no expenditure be allowed, except under the direction of such officer. Parents who understand the importance of this advice, will not neglect it. *The Officers will not feel responsible for evil habits acquired by students in consequence of a neglect to heed this suggestion.*

Parents wishing their children under the immediate watchcare of the teachers, should have them board in the Institution.

All students from abroad are required to board in the Institution, unless, on application, they are permitted by the Faculty to board out.

Requirements for Admission.

1st. Familiarity with Arithmetic through Common Fractions.

2d. Such knowledge of Geography, that in the opinion of the Faculty they can pass the Regents' examination by pursuing the study one term.

3d. Ability to pass a satisfactory examination in the elements of English Grammar.

Merit Roll.

A record is made of each student's daily recitations.

Parents or guardians can obtain a copy of this account at any time by applying to the Principal.

Government.

The methods of discipline employed are designed to cultivate in students the habit, and develop the power, of self-government. But few precepts are enjoined. To guard against over-work and injury to health, all students are required to retire by ten o'clock.

Association of Ladies and Gentlemen is permitted, on special application, as far as is thought consistent with studious habits. All association without special excuse, is forbidden.

Attendance at Church is required on the Sabbath, in the morning at some church in the village, chosen for the term by the student or his friends, and in the afternoon at the college chapel.

For the rest, deference to the authority of superiors and to the wishes of equals, neatness, quietness, and industry are inculcated, as essential characteristics of the scholarly lady or gentleman.

Wood is furnished at cost, each student being charged for the amount actually burned. Rooms are furnished with stoves, tables, chairs, bedsteads and bedding (except sheets and pillow-cases); students furnish whatever else they need.

Incidentals are charged from the time of entrance to the close of the term; and no deduction is made except in cases of previous agreement or continued sickness. No deduction is made for those who enter within two weeks of the commencement of the term.

Financial communications should be addressed to Rev. A. D. WILBOR, Treasurer; communications on the subject of Board, &c., to Rev. O. TROWBRIDGE, Steward; and on Instruction and Government to the PRINCIPAL.

Payment for Board and Incidentals must be arranged in advance. But in case a student is obliged to leave the Institution on account of sickness, his money will be refunded.

None will be admitted to the privileges of the Institution until they have arranged their account with the Treasurer, and registered their names, ages and places of residence with the Principal or Preceptress.

Students are not allowed, without express permission, to receive instruction in any branch of study from persons not employed by the Board of Trustees.

Damages to the building and furniture are charged to those who commit them, or to the occupant of the room.

Location, Etc.

This Institution is located in the most healthy and beautiful portion of Western New York, in the midst of one of the most productive and thriving farming regions of the State. It is easy of access, being only eighteen miles from Rochester, with which it is connected by a good road, and only four miles from the New York Central Railroad, Honeoye Falls Station. It is also within seven miles of the Buffalo and Corning and Genesee Valley Branch of the Erie Railroads, Avon Springs Station. We thus enjoy the advantage of Railroads, without the disadvantages, which they would occasion to a school like ours, if passing through the place.

While the Institution is unsectarian, the utmost attention is paid to the moral and religious welfare of the students. We record, with gratitude, that these exertions, have, with the blessing of God, been highly successful.
