

## UNIVERSITY LIBRARY

Andrew Carnegie Gave \$150,000 for it.

THE REV. J. D. PHELPS'S WORK

Ironmaster Makes His Second Splendid Gift to Syracuse, a Library That Will Accommodate 300,000 Volumes—How This Gift Was Secured.

Andrew Carnegie's gift of \$150,000 to Syracuse university for a library, announced today, makes possible the taking of another important step in carrying out the plan for the development of the university laid out by Chancellor James B. Day and the trustees. In all probability work on the new library will begin this summer, so that with the other buildings to go up half a million dollars' worth of work will be inaugurated on the campus this year.

The news of the generosity of the famous iron master caused unbounded enthusiasm on the part of the undergraduates today and universal wide-spread joy and satisfaction on the part of graduates and friends of the university as well as citizens generally. With the \$225,000 city library to be dedicated this week and the announcement of another library to come Syracuse has the greatest reason to be grateful to the Great Sinner.

Chancellor Day and the Rev. Dr. James D. Phelps, the financial secretary of the university, through whose efforts this latest gift was secured, were showered with congratulations this morning. Chancellor Day was at his office shortly after 8 o'clock this morning as usual. He made the following statement about the gift of the library:

The Chancellor's Announcement.

"For some time we have had plans prepared for a library building for the university which would be more adequate for our needs than the present structure. As the ideas are largely my own and have not been passed upon by the trustees it would be impossible to give them out in detail. The location of the library, however, is practically decided upon. It will be south of the present athletic field between the grand stand and the western end of the oval. It will be practically in the center of the campus. The new library will have stacks and shelves sufficient to accommodate 300,000 volumes. The building will contain seminar rooms for the different departments of the university, such as the history, biology, English, German, Sciences and classical departments. The general reading room will be very commodious. In view of the fact that the university will not have to buy a site for the new building, practically the whole of the \$150,000 can be used for the building itself.

"Although at present the site chosen for the library seems to be on one side of the campus, we are looking to the future. In a few years the library will be surrounded by other structures. In addition to the Lyman C. Smith College of Applied Science, which is to be enlarged this year by the new laboratory and the hall of Natural History, we expect that soon there will be erected dormitories for young men in College place.

**New Quadrangle of Buildings.**  
"The present Archbold oval is to be the center of a new quadrangle of buildings. Among the changes of the near future will be the removal of the Holden observatory to the top of the big hill at the southeastern extremity of the campus known as Mount Olympus.

"Upon the completion of the new library the present library building will be used as the administration building of the university. Among the offices to be located here will be those of the Chancellor, the registrar and the treasurer. There will also be provision for committee rooms, as a good deal of the work of the trustees is divided up among committees.

**Credit Due to Dr. Phelps.**  
"To Doctor Phelps is due much of the credit for securing the interest of Mr. Carnegie. So far as I know active efforts in this direction have been carried on only a month. Doctor Phelps's tact and ability in handling the matter are worthy of unstinted praise."

Mr. Carnegie asked for and was given a complete statement of facts concerning the university a few weeks ago. It was prepared by Doctor Phelps and Treasurer W. W. Porter.

It was stated this morning that the new library will not encroach upon the present athletic field so as to interfere with the use of the running track or football field, but the university golf links will suffer further inconvenience.

One of the most valuable features which the new library structure will house is the famous historical collection of the German historian, Leopold von Ranke, which was secured by the university by Mrs. John M. Reid in 1887, and is now the envy of all institutions that maintain departments of history. The present library building was dedicated June 24th, 1889.

**Other New Buildings.**

While the plans for the new building, as the Chancellor states, have not been adopted yet, it is probable that the building will be about 100x150 feet in dimensions, of stone and brick fireproof construction and will face the north. Before the end of the summer it is likely that work will be progressing upon the following buildings on the 80-acre campus: The Lyman Hall of Natural History, the Lyman C. Smith college laboratory, the Carnegie library and the Archbold stadium. It is reported that assurances have been received from one of the trustees that a Christian association building will be given soon, while a new gymnasium is thought to be an assured thing at an early date.

The number of students at Syracuse university is now 2,500, having more than doubled since Chancellor Day came here seven years ago.

**Concessions to Mad Mullah.**  
Rome, March 20.—In concluding peace with Great Britain through the mediation of Italy, the Mad Mullah has obtained permission definitely to occupy 110x a village on Italian territory, 150 miles from Orabia, which was the base of operations in the last campaign led by General Manning. The price for the concession is a quantity of a prohibition of trade in arms and slaves.

## ARCHBOLD MAY GIVE A LARGE CENTRAL BUILDING

A New Gymnasium Is Also Expected Soon—Lewis County Man Gives University a Valuable Farm.

Dr. J. D. Phelps said this morning that the Carnegie gift is the forerunner of some more important ones likely to be announced soon. "We are working on several other propositions," said Doctor Phelps, "and expect results soon. The interest in the university on the part of men of wealth is very great now. I can say unhesitatingly that the victory of the crews at Poughkeepsie last year has been of immense advantage to the university in the way of advertising, as have also been the numerous recent gifts."

Chancellor Day and Doctor Phelps knew several days ago that Mr. Carnegie was favorably disposed toward Syracuse's application for a library, but the fact was not given out until John D. Archbold, president of the board of trustees, had been made acquainted with the prospect. It seems that Mr. Archbold had planned to give a library to the university himself. Now, it is stated as probable that his contemplated benefaction will take the form of another building, possibly a central building with a large chapel and auditorium.

An announcement expected soon is that of a new gymnasium. A person in au-

thority said this morning that the prospects in that direction are very bright indeed.

Doctor Phelps said this morning that an 80-year-old Lewis county man last week gave the university a 350-acre dairy farm in that county. It is valued at \$7,000. The donor's name at his own request is withheld. Doctor Phelps and treasurer Porter will go to Lewis county next week to look over the property.

**Shriners Going to Watertown.**  
The Shriners' association of Central New York will have a special train to Watertown, leaving the New York Central station at 9 P. M. to-morrow. The Syracuse Masons will visit Media Temple of the Nobles of the Mystic Shrine, where degrees will be conferred in full form with Oriental ceremony.

**Dispensation by the Pope.**  
The Pope has granted a general dispensation to all the Catholics of the world from the fasting and abstinence prescribed on Saturday, March 25th, on which day the feast of the Annunciation is celebrated as a holy day of obligation. The use of meat is allowed on that day at both the principal meals.

## GOV. HIGGINS HELPED

Gave Dr. Phelps a Letter of Introduction to Carnegie.

Name Got the Doctor to the Proper Secretary and Syracusean Didn't See the Ironmaster at All—Chancellor Says New Stadium Won't Interfere With Links.

The Rev. J. D. Phelps, financial secretary of Syracuse university, told the members at the Methodist preachers' meeting this morning how he succeeded in securing the gift of \$150,000 for a library for Syracuse university from Andrew Carnegie. Dr. Phelps was armed with a letter of introduction from Governor Higgins. He told of going to Mr. Carnegie's New York home and of being met by various members of the cordon of secretaries of various rank, and how he passed one after another, his card and the name "Syracuse university" being

sufficient to carry him to the private secretary who takes care of all of Mr. Carnegie's philanthropic work. After his interview with this secretary, Dr. Phelps submitted a typewritten report of what he wanted and of the need of the university. He did not see Mr. Carnegie at all. Then Dr. Phelps told of waiting and watching for the letter which finally came, telling him that his request had been granted.

The committee appointed last week at the meeting of the University Hill Golf club to consult with Chancellor James B. Day of Syracuse university as to the probable location of the new stadium met him this morning and together they went over the grounds and discussed the matter. The Chancellor told the members of the committee that the stadium will be located so that the east end, leaving room for the new gymnasium, which will probably be built within a year, will be on a line with the east end of the Steel Hall of Physics. This will leave ample room for the links between the west end of the field and Irving arena. The new hall of natural science will effect the course even more than the new athletic field. One of the officers of the club said this morning that plans to obviate that difficulty were made some time ago. The course will probably be moved over the hill farther.
