 The rooms on the outside of the corridors on both floors are to be used for seminar purposes, with the exception of the librarian's room and the Von Ranke room. All these rooms are to be finished in quartered oak. The librarian's room is situated near the southeast corner of the main floor, in easy communication with the delivery desk. The Von Ranke room occupies the extreme front of the second floor. It is to be fitted with two-tier stacks, to contain the Von Ranke collection of historical works, exhibition cases for rare books and papers and reading tables and desk.

The news and magazine stacks occupy the large room in the center of the basement. It will accommodate two hundred thousand volumes. Other rooms in the basement are the reading room, receiving room, cataloging department, bindery and the janitor's apartments.

The stairways are all constructed of marble treads and risers and ornamental iron balustrades. They are wainscoted with Tennessee marble, the same as the corridors. The Library will be completed about May 1.
